



'This music comes from an Aussie heart and it seems to be in the hearts of so many Aussies,' says John Williamson in typically casual form.

Really, there's nothing casual about a man who quite clearly is the master of his craft and has the uncanny knack to speak what's on our collective minds.

In John Williamson at the Sydney Opera House, you'll see an artist in full flight. Join him in the front row for a concert which will make you laugh, take in a serious moment and perhaps even shed a tear.

Recorded on one of the two night concert series at the Sydney Opera House accompanied by the Sydney Symphony Orchestra, the concert shows off an unexpected side to "VIIIO" and at the same time recalls everything you've come to love about the iconic singer, songwriter, guitarist and storyteller.

With the Sydney Symphony Orchestra behind him, John's music jumps and edges into every corner of the room, nudging like a playful puppy wanting the playful puppy wanting the feels like the roof is just an illusion and the audience really are sitting under a blanket of stars in the bush.

With the ever-present campfire at his feet and long-time musical companion Col Watson by his side, the set list features typical songs like 'Galleries of Pink Galahs', 'Boogie with m' Baby', 'Salisbury Street', 'Mallee Boy', 'Cootamundra Wattle' and of course 'Old Man Emu' and 'True Blue'.

Forty years is a good time to celebrate, especially when it's celebrating four decades as a singer-songwriter in one of the world's toughest businesses. What's exciting is that John has never veered from his vision. He's held course and continued to sing, write and talk about his deep love for the landscape, the urgency to preserve it and the things which make us quintessentially Australian.

The songs are everything from love notes and paeans to the bush to protest songs reminding us we need to tread carefully. No matter how he does it though, there's always warmth, sincerity and a touch of humour in his words and delivery. John considers it's a victory for all Aussies to see this kind of music orchestrated and the troohy is music.

'Doing the show was an unbelievable experience which went better than I could ever have hoped for,' says John, 'I was initially very nervous but once I settled in, I had a really great time. Like the audience, in places I found myself getting pretty emotional too. It was like getting emotional after winning the footy, you get a bit sentimental.'

This concert series was a first for John and the October 2010 recording came hot on the heels of John's long-awaited induction into the ARIA Hall of Fame.

'I love the fact that there are kids who grew up in this country driving around it with their parents and listening to these songs. They've all invited me in some small way to be part of their family. I don't consider myself a star, I consider myself part of the family.'

Three cheers for a True Blue national treasure.
